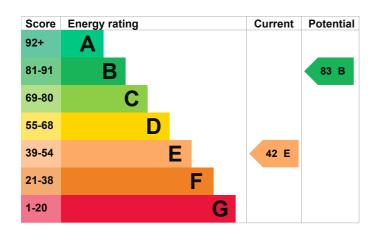
Properties can be let if they have an energy rating from A to E.

Energy rating and score

Primary energy use

How this affects your energy bills

An average household would need to spend £1,208 per year on heating, hot water and lighting in this property. These costs usually make up the majority of your energy bills.
